Citywide Drugs Crisis Campaign – Progress Report 2017

This report outlines progress on 42 actions in our 2017 workplan under three objectives:

- 1. To support, develop and facilitate the involvement of communities in the structures, the implementation of the existing NDS and in the development of the new NDS
- 2. Ensure that the experience of communities in dealing with and responding to the drugs crisis forms part of the policymaking process through a partnership approach
- 3. To increase general awareness of the drugs crisis and campaign on relevant issues

The research will explore practitioners and their organisations responses to the involvement of young people in the drugs trade. The interviews will explore processes and relationships at local level for analysing and acting upon local problems and issues. The research will also analyse and distil key documents including evaluations, internal reports and reviews together with available international research evidence on models of best practice. CW met with Gurchand Singh, the Garda Data Analyst about the potential of the Community Impact Assessment Tool in data collection.
