All evidence shows that most drug users are using a combination of drugs both legal and illegal. Heroin continues to have a major grip on many communities and cocaine is causing wide-spread problems throughout the country.

Cocaine

A recent Citywide survey found that local community drug projects have experienced a major increase in people presenting with cocaine as their main drug of choice since 2004.

In 2004, 14% of the projects reported seeing clients with what they then described as problematic cocaine *use* - now 62% of projects are seeing clients with cocaine as_their main drug of choice. 50% of projects are seeing an overall increase in cocaine use amongst their clients since 2004

The findings of the Citywide survey are supported by national data on cocaine: In 2005 there were 968 cocaine seizures.

In 2005, cocaine-related prosecutions accounted for 13% of the total, surpassing heroin-related prosecutions (11%) for the first time.

Heroin

As communities struggle with the impact of cocaine, there are also major fears about the impact of increasing availability of heroin. Heroin is now so readily available, even in rural areas, that two of the biggest seizures to date of the drug here in recent months had no impact on its availability or price on the street. Provisional Garda seizure figures to the end of October 2006 show an increase in seizures of heroin and cocaine. According to these figures in the first 10 months of 2006 heroin worth €20 million and cocaine worth €14 million has been taken in significant seizures.

The recent tragic deaths of heroin addicts illustrate the terrible cost to people their families and communities from our failure to deal properly with the drugs crisis. People in our communities continue to die from drugs. Each year more names are being added to the lists of the dead at the memorial services that now take place in communities' right across the city.

Violence & Intimidation

There were 25 gun related deaths in the state during 2006. Organised crime is at its highest point ever according to Gardai who have expressed "considerable concern" at the cycle of gun violence in Dublin that saw five men shot dead in six days. Local communities are reporting:

- Families are living in fear of dealers and loan sharks
- Threats have been made by dealers and lenders to burn down family homes

Key commitments given in 2002 as part of the National Drug Strategy have not been met - these include setting up the Community Policing Fora initiative in fourteen local communities and targeting of assets of middle-ranking criminals involved in drug dealing.

There is a National Drugs Strategy - Implement it!
